comes to "special" needs animals I have zero control.

Those that are left behind, passed over, rejected over and over, are my favorites. They see others going home but they stay. I've watched people walk by the cages looking for their perfect animal. One day a family stopped to look at one cat that had short deformed front legs. They gasped, stepped back and said Ewww! Sight unseen I knew he (Wilber) was going home with me.

Perhaps their eyes are cloudy and misshapen due to an infection. They may have a missing limb or eye or be a bit dizzy and unsteady looking. Imperfect black cats and dogs have a double whammy as do the senior cats and dogs, abandoned and confused as to why they are there. They usually don't get a second look.

Well, from experience let me say that these special babies, no matter their problem, find a way to get around. No obstacle seems insurmountable to them.

The blind use some kind of radar and seem sighted,

playing with toys and finding a cozy spot to nap. The wobble cerebral hyperplasia cats use their tails as a sort of rudder or balance pole and climb where others jump. The old are just happy to have a lap or place in the sun.


Presently, we have Bella Rose, who is blind but expertly navigates the entire house. She plays with a crinkly ball, curls up in the sun, air boxes some imaginary foe and loves to snuggle with our pit mix Buddy. She makes us smile.

Rocky is our other wonder cat. He has cerebral hyperplasia that causes a very unbalanced "rocky" gait. He sometimes falls over, but undeterred he gets right back up. He can't jump onto things but can climb like a champ. He wobbles his way to greet me when I enter a room from wherever he is. Rocky curls up next to my head at night and after a few kisses, he purrs himself and me to sleep. He makes us smile.

We are always in awe of their strength, resilience and spirit. Handicapped? No!

Project Save


Project Save has been a program at PAHS since 1997, inspired by our dear friend, Emily Ross.

The animals in Project Save are longtime residents, some that are older, or have medical or behavioral issues that make it difficult to find their "forever" homes. We have had many of these pets find homes, and when they do, we celebrate! It doesn't happen all the time, though. So PAHS becomes their forever home. No, there is no couch to sleep on, but they have a whole group of people who love them, care for them, protect them and accept them.

We have had many animals supported over the years by many generous sponsors. At this moment we have 4 cats and 4 dogs in the program. Sponsors donate \$10.00 a month to support their chosen animal.

The cats in Project Save at this time are Woodchuck and Cinnamon, which are both feline aids positive. They live with 2 other nice FIV+ cats. Tulip is a cat that couldn't get along with other cats in a cage but has gotten along with the lobby cats. She is wonderful. Junior has just been added to the group after Stiletto died. He is a very social boy who has been with us for a while.

The dogs in the group are: Hercules, who has been at PAHS for the longest time. We're not sure why he has stayed here most of his life, but we are his family. Tory came in pregnant and all her puppies were adopted and she remained. We owed it to her. Duece was adopted and then



came back to PAHS, not because he did anything wrong, but because the family dynamics changed. And now we have Wallace, who filled the void when our Jixer died. Wallace's owner died and when no one could take him, we did.

Just a reminder...

It is so important that the cats and dogs you live with are vaccinated against rabies. Even if your cat never goes outside (which is the only way to keep them safe), your feline needs to be vaccinated. It is your defense against a disease that is 100% fatal.

The first rabies vaccine is good for a year, after that your pet should be vaccinated every 3 years. Rabies clinics, which are free, are usually held in January. You do not have to be a resident of the town holding the clinic in order to have your pet vaccinated. Check with your town or county board of health for dates.

You then need to license your cat or dog. This is a state law and needs to be renewed every January. The license is proof that your animal is vaccinated against rabies and it is also a form of identification.
